Voluntary Voting

The Liberal Party under John Howard's leadership is the party of constructive reform.

A necessary reform which will enhance the freedoms of Australians while not losing a single intelligent vote is the introduction of voluntary voting.

New Zealand has yet again successfully conducted an election with voluntary voting with at latest count, eight out of ten New Zealanders voluntarily exercising their right to vote, and I commend New Zealand on that, and commend New Zealand voters on voluntarily turning out to cast their vote, without the force of compulsion, as we have in Australia. And indeed it's remarkable that New Zealanders have democratic rights that we don't. In New Zealand you can choose whether or not to vote. In this country you're guilty of an offence if you choose not to vote. 19 September 2005 to ABC reporter Alexandra Kirk on the PM program.

The current system of compulsory voting is undemocratic and should be dumped.... This is a matter of quite profound principle, that in a democracy a fundamental civil liberty should be whether or not people choose to vote, I find it thoroughly offensive that Australians who choose not to vote are guilty of an offence. It should be a democratic right not to [vote].
